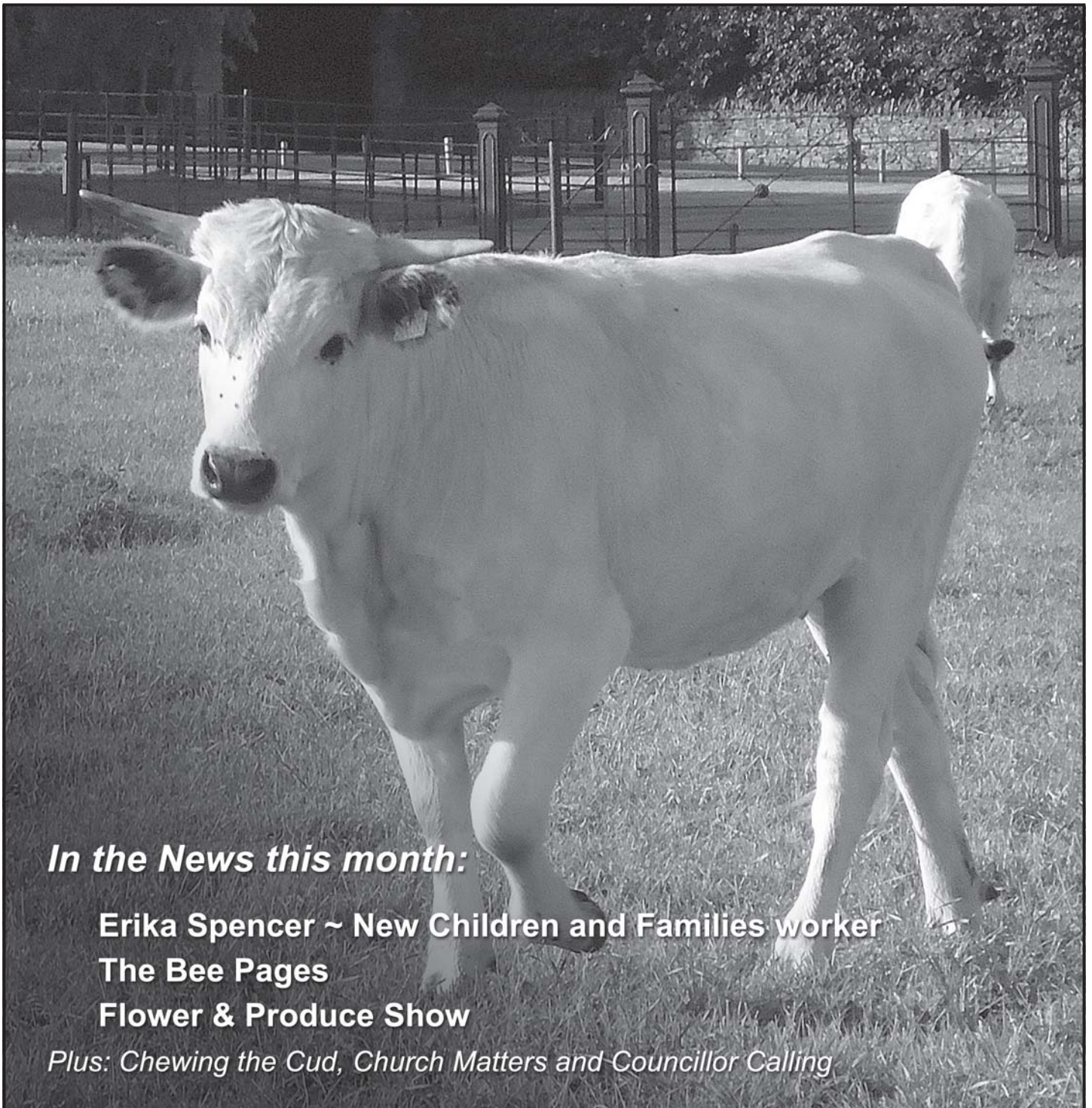

CHAIRMAN Chewing the Cud

Time really flies when you are enjoying yourself, so please, please tell me where August has gone to. Still at least the weather has been quite good; the odd few days of rain have certainly helped the gardens.

The ballot for the village hall is drawing to a close. However, it was decided to extend the final date until Bank Holiday Monday. We wanted to give everyone the chance to have their say regarding this project, and it was difficult to get as many votes in as possible with people being away on holiday. The result will be given at the next Village Meeting on Thursday September 15th. We will also be discussing further the proposal to create a village plan for North Aston.

With the reduction of traffic through North Aston we have tried to get the kerbing completed. We had a very generous offer from Nicholsons to do the work but at the eleventh hour we were thwarted by health and safety. You need a licence for this and a licence for that, and it would seem you have to be qualified to put out traffic cones now. When speaking to Paul Wilson, who is the Highways Steward for Cherwell, he has suggested that we put our name forward towards community funding to complete the work. We have to make a contribution to the work required and the council pay the outstanding amount. We are now in the hat for this funding.

I have had details from the OCC regarding winter maintenance; they are going to give every Parish a one ton bag of salt and top up any grit bins. We currently do not have any grit bins, and while we have need for them, the village will have to pay for them. The cost will be in the region of £200 each, and we would then have to keep the bins topped up ourselves out of the one ton bag. We certainly could have done with them last winter.

I think it would be a good idea to have our own Emergency Plan which would be distributed to every household.

All this will be discussed at the next Village Meeting.

Do not forget the Village Flower & Produce Show on Saturday 3rd of September. When you submit your entries you will get details of times for placing your exhibits in the marquees.

I have only four months left as Chairman and I have already been told that I will miss the job. It is though very encouraging that there are people in the village willing to put themselves forward to take over.

As a result of a complaint made to Cherwell District Council about the overgrown state of some of the village footpaths, Sarah Aldous, the Rights of Way Field Officer for CDC Northeast, has advised the Village Meeting that the gates that (at the time of writing) create a length of enclosed pathway alongside the Park to North Aston Hall will have to be removed. Her full "adjudication" will be available at the Village Meeting on the 15th.

This is an unfortunate development, as it means that the secure, dog-proof stretch of path that some residents had worked hard to persuade Kevin Cash to include will now be lost. This also comes at a time when a regular mowing regime had already been arranged. Perhaps this is an occasion where speaking directly with neighbours in a spirit of community might have been a more effective course of action, rather than resorting to the heavy hand of writing letters to bureaucratic officials.

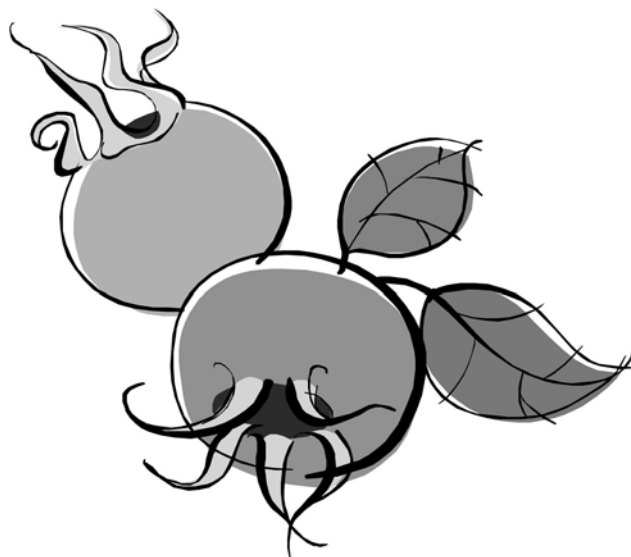

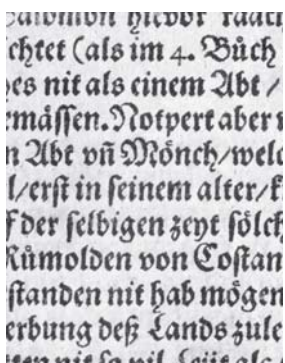
Ride+Stride 2011

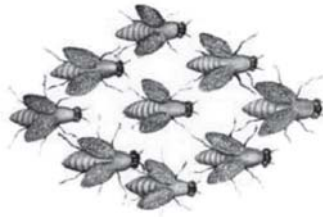

HONEYBEE GROUP is an informal gathering of villagers from North Aston. Our dedication is to learn more about the lifecycle & sustainable habitat of the honeybee to discover how North Aston village can offer:

- **sanctuary** from chemicals
- **landscapes** with bee-kind blossom
- **closer to nature beekeeping**

‘The bees know what they are doing: our job is to listen to them and provide the optimum conditions for their well-being.’ Phil Chandler

Miche writes: James Fearnley gave an illuminating talk at the Conference about the therapeutic value of propolis. I am inspired by the healing substances that are created by the honeybee. Honey is a miracle food - providing vital nourishment for the hive brood & adult bees during winter, as well as food for humans. It is also a powerful remedy for burns & cuts. So to hear James on propolis has been my latest discovery. Propolis is made within hives of the Western honeybee (*Apis mellifera*) which is found all over the globe. Known as the ‘defender of the city’, this dark sticky material is made with tree resins collected in spring and combined with wax to create a unique substance. Propolis plays a vital function in the health of the bee colony. It is used as a building material to strengthen comb and seal cracks, and for keeping out light and to maintain warmth in the hive. Similar to the role resin plays as part of the tree’s immune system, so propolis provides medicinal defences for the bees because of its anti-bacterial & antibiotic properties. It can be described as an externalised form of immune system for the beehive.

Kildare writes: Miche, Flora and I joined the UK’s first Natural Beekeeping Conference over near Worcester last month; what an inspiring occasion that was! A tented village in an utterly bee-friendly organic meadow by a river-bank; here over 120 bee-experts, -lovers and -keepers discussed in great detail numerous aspects of the challenges facing bees and bee-keepers, shared in the knowledge of some of the greatest experts in this field, dedicated themselves to keeping bees in the most natural and friendly ways possible and to do everything possible to allow bees to sustain their lives in a world that is severely challenged (thanks to us humans). It was organised by Friends of the Bees and the Natural Beekeeping Trust. (www.friendsofthebees.org) (www.naturalbeekeepingtrust.org).

In later **B E E PAGES** we’ll suggest a whole range of bee-friendly plants that you could grow. One thing I have done is acquire some young Manuka plants (*Leptospermum scorparium*) This big bushy shrub grows wild in the New Zealand alpine highlands; the seeds are collected there and raised in the UK. The pollen contains potent antifungal, antibacterial antiseptic and antiviral essential oils, and bees love it. Hopefully these will start flowering in a couple of years and we can raise more from seed and dot them around the village. We just HAVE to try to compensate for the wholesale loss of wild habitat and biodiversity that has been going on for the past 60 years. The signs are that North Aston is very willing to try to help do this.

Councillor Calling



Two new self-service initiatives to save some money start off this month's news, after which you may detect a pronounced green tinge to the Cherwell news....

Automated Systems

Kiosks have been installed in all CDC's offices to enable payment of council tax, business rates, car park season tickets, new recycling bins and even fines. If you've been sent an invoice, you'll need it for the machine to read your bar code, otherwise follow the instructions and, if baffled, there'll be staff around to help. This doesn't change the arrangements for paying at Post Offices and Paypoints, which remain unaffected. What it should do is to reduce queues and free more staff to deal with complicated queries – making life easier for everybody.

Bin Liners

Compostable bag dispensers have also been installed, to dish out rolls of the liners for those little brown kitchen food waste "caddies" at a cost of £2.50 for a roll of 30. These ones have been cunningly adapted from a design originally meant to sell pocket umbrellas!

Anything that makes food recycling easier is to be welcomed, as we still send 5,000 tons of the stuff to landfill in our green bills, incurring charges of £220,000 which could be well used elsewhere in these tough times and generating methane, one of the worst greenhouse gases, on decomposition. I learned this week that it's important never to use ordinary plastic bags in the brown bin as, in the composting process at Ardley, they prevent air getting to some "hot spots" and so generate foul odours which, if not careful, can plague our neighbours in Ardley and Middleton Stoney.

Setting an Example

Recycling isn't just for households, though. A survey of District Council offices put the councils themselves on the spot to see if they were leading by example or belonged to the "do as I say, not as I do" school of leadership. Happily to report, Cherwell came out with flying colours and has plans to do even better – so we are all in this together.

New Collections

Bin collections, changes to which I warned of last month, seem to have gone very smoothly with very few hiccups. Perhaps because we prepared for the worst, issued many warnings along with endless publicity, the biggest changes to collection days since the introduction of the blue bins themselves, seems to have gone off without a hitch – many thanks to all who were affected.

Permission Granted

Green news of a different sort is the granting of planning permission for the first "exemplar" site of the North West Bicester eco development. This will see about 400 houses, a third of them affordable, built up at the North of the intended area around Caversfield to demonstrate the concept. There will also be a community centre, nursery, primary school and pub to ensure this initial community can be self sustaining. What we now need is a master plan for the whole site to show how it all fits together and avoid the risk of piecemeal development.

House Conversions

Caversfield is also the site of a totally different project which came up at the same meeting – the conversion of the old RAF Bicester accommodation – last known as DLO Caversfield – into housing. The developers have had quite a task coping with a conservation area and many listed buildings because RAF Bicester, like Upper Heyford but from a different period, is considered precious by English Heritage so not a lot can be changed, yet a huge range of crumbling buildings, constructed for completely different purposes to very different standards, must be turned into desirable 21st century homes. Unfortunately, the cost of doing this has precluded any affordable housing, which I objected to but was outvoted. Despite that, it will be fascinating to watch this scheme unfold.

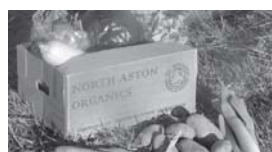
