Celebrating VE & VJ Day

This year marks the 80th anniversary of the end of WW2. The *Soldiers of Oxfordshire Museum* in Woodstock is marking the occasion with a new exhibition; *From Conflict to Peace*. The display features stories of Oxfordshire celebrating VE & VJ Day 80 years ago and will open on Tuesday, 1st April and run through to 18th November.

Full Fibre Broadband

About 18 months ago we were told that installation of full-fibre (FFTP) would begin in the spring of 2025. Well, spring has arrived, and the good news is, the diggers shouldn't be too far behind.

Michelle Tanfield, the local Community Engagement Manager for Gigaclear, has emailed to say that she plans to stage a Community Meeting later this month. This will be an opportunity for the company to inform everyone about the process, and clarify the schedule for the coming months.

Work will begin almost simultaneously in both North Aston and Duns Tew, so it seems likely that the meeting will be staged in Duns Tew, where they have the facilities to accommodate a larger gathering. The date and venue should be confirmed by mid-April, and householders will be advised by post. If all goes to plan, we should have fast, reliable full-fibre broadband by the end of the year.

Pop-up Farm Shop

What set out small last year looks to be growing into something really quite significant, as we look forward to another pop-up Farm Shop at Peach Barns on Saturday April 12th, 1-4pm.

If you missed the previous Pop-ups, then you've been denied a real treat! Combining elements of farm shop and farmers' market, the Peach Barns Pop-up is a showcase for all the food and other goods produced here in North Aston, as well as the skills and crafts of a range of other local producers.

As well as organic beef, lamb and dairy from North Aston Farms, and vegetables, fruit and herbs from North Aston Organics, there will be bread, eggs, cheese, pork, chicken, chocolate and beer, as well as a variety of crafts, refreshments, tea & cakes, plus burgers and steaks from the BBQ.

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North Aston Nature Notes With Stephen Rees

Hello to all, and welcome to spring. On the 23rd of last month Wendy and I walked down to the pond to see if spring was getting near, and the signs were clear. There was frog spawn everywhere, and a huge chorus of frogs calling to each other. It was really loud, especially in the top pond, where they were fighting and mating. We caught it at just the right moment.



There was also a Tufted Duck, a Dabchick, several Mallards and, best of all, a fish swimming along on the surface. It wasn't a big fish, but at least it was a fish. Brilliant! With Buzzards, Kites and a Kestrel mewing overhead, and Ravens too, it was a nice little walk.



Going back up the hill I got to thinking about how different it all looked when we were kids. We used to be down there a lot because of *Hendon Race*. That was the name we had for the track from Hendon, where Andrew Hitchens lived, to the farm and dairy below the church, which is where he went to work. We used to race our bikes down the hill and see who could go the furthest up the other side before having to get off and push.

The dairy was really great for us, and Andrew was very good to us, letting us in the milking parlour to watch him milk the cows and giving us cups of warm milk, straight from the udder. The milking shed had a big square hole in the middle of the floor, where Andrew or Phil Burke (who later turned into one of

my best friends ever) would stand to put the milking machines on the cows. It was a bit of a dangerous job — you had a really good chance of getting pooed on.

Twice a day they milked the cows, and a good few people would walk down with a bottle to get some fresh milk. I loved it, but if you offered me fresh unpasteurised warm milk now I think I'd probably throw up.

Rats! There were rats galore. All the stone sheds where the calves were kept had loads of rats in them, and we had great fun with our air pistols trying to shoot them. It was a challenge, trying to look tough and brave when going into the sheds, but really being scared to death of the rats.

Bird-nesting down there was brilliant too. There were so many different places where you could go to find a nest, look at the beautiful eggs, and cross them off our lists. Best of all was the slurry pit. It stunk. It bubbled, like it was alive, and it was brown and warm. It was behind the dairy, and it was where they pushed all the poo after they'd finished milking, and we loved it. Towards the back, where it was oldest, a hard crust developed, and we would dare one another to run over it.

This next bit is a true story. I'm not making it up, honest! One day the postman decided to take a short cut to Dairy Cottage, and he chose to go across the slurry pit. It must have looked really crusty and firm, but half way over, the crust broke, and he went through. He was up to his neck in oldest, stinkiest cow poo. I didn't see it myself, of course. I was at school, but my big brother told me all about it ... and he wouldn't lie ... would he? Happy Easter! Stephen & Wendy

Josh is on the run ...

This month Josh Potts makes his début in the London Marathon. It's been something on his "bucket list" for years, so he applied for a place last April, never expecting to be accepted at the first attempt. Much to his surprise, when the ballot was drawn in June, his name was included.

At the time he wasn't really a runner at all, but recognised that it was an opportunity he might never get again. Accepting was the easy part. What followed has been months of hard work and determination. He started by training locally, on the roads around North Aston, but soon built up to his first competitive run in the London Vitality 10k event last September. It went well, and others followed. Before long he began to appreciate how much better he felt, not only physically but also in himself, mentally. He also discovered that he was actually quite good at running, and completed a whole string of races, mainly at 10k, but also across longer distances.

He's been training ever since, five evenings a week, either out running or in the gym. Having discovered how much running has benefitted his own mental wellbeing, Josh has chosen to run the Marathon in aid of Bipolar UK, a mental health charity with close personal ties; his older sister Kate was diagnosed with Bipolar Disorder when she was a young adult.

"Bipolar is challenging, not just for the person with the illness, but for those around them too," she says. "As an illness it is very often poorly understood, which in turn can make things harder for those suffering with it to get the help they need. Organisations like Bipolar UK educate others about what is a severe and sometimes devastating condition, as well as supporting people affected by bipolar — those with the illness as well as those around them. They offer online support and in-person groups, along with helpful day-to-day interventions, like a free mood-tracking App. Bipolar UK stands up for and stands with people with the condition."

Kate's journey with bipolar has been an inspiration to Josh, and he says her courage has shown him the importance of organisations like Bipolar UK, who strive to broaden people's understanding of the disorder, and directly help those who suffer from it. They receive less than 10% of their funding from government, and rely heavily on charitable donations, as well as people like Josh who raise money and awareness through sponsorship in events like the London Marathon. They need that support to sustain and grow their vital services.

Traffic

Howard Ionascu has kindly picked up the baton from Niel, and before him, Tony and Marcus, with regard to liaising on traffic matters through the village, and writes:

Our local Councillor, Andrew McHugh (Deddington and local villages representative to Cherwell District Council) has been extremely helpful in trying to move things along in terms of traffic mitigation measures for the village.

He reports that North Aston currently has £14,500 of Section 106 money, currently unspent, that could be used for traffic calming. He has prepared a map (below, in draft form) with some suggestions to be put forward to OCC for consultation, and has asked that North Aston residents consult amongst themselves to ensure everyone is happy with the ideas.

Ardley and Somerton Parish Councils are keen to put in an application from all three villages. It saves everyone money.

The suggestions for North Aston include:

- A reduction to 40mph of the limit between the A4260 at The Fox and the entrance to the village, keeping the limit at 20mph through the village itself.
- Moving the village entry sign further west, to a point beyond Bee Cottage and nearer to Peach Barns
- The introduction of three chicanes: one at each end of the village, and a third near the middle by the Green.
- The introduction of a 40mph limit between North Aston and Somerton.

These proposals, together with others, such as a preference for speed humps rather than (or in addition to) chicanes, will be discussed at this month's Village Meeting (on Monday 14th April in the Old Bakery).

The question of traffic calming through North Aston has been a recurrent theme for the best part of twenty years. All these options, and more besides, have been discussed at length, but this is the first time that there has been direct involvement by CDC and OCC, and a realistic prospect of progress.

Those previous discussions must be set aside and the slate wiped clean. If you would like your say, then please attend the Village Meeting. The map below is very much in "draft" form and includes a number of potential errors, such as the positioning of the "build-outs" or chicanes, but these can all be addressed during the discussion process.





A World of Change

The seasons are again changing, thankfully. We have been treated to a few warmer days and nights. A few weeks ago snowdrops covered the churchyard and now bright yellow daffodils are nodding their heads in the breeze, heralding spring. The clocks have changed, jumping forward an hour, bringing longer and lighter evenings.

In our world things are constantly changing, sometimes at a pace faster than we would like. The rate of change in the world of technology is particularly rapid, with certain pieces of technology being invented, superseded and made obsolete within a few years. The way we listen to music for instance, moving from records, to audio tapes to compact disc and MP3 players and now using music platforms via our phones or other devices.



As our world constantly evolves and changes we can find ourselves appreciating and valuing things that stay the same, such as traditions, as they can help keep us rooted and grounded. On the 4th week of Lent (this year on the last Sunday of March) we celebrated Mothering Sunday. The celebration has shifted over the years, with more of a focus today on celebrating mothers. Traditionally it was a celebration honouring 'Mother Churches,' returning to where we were Baptised/Christened. The 4th Sunday of Lent is also known as Refreshment, when the lenten fast would be relaxed and celebrated with a Simnel Cake (a light fruit cake) decorated with two layers of marzipan and eleven eggs (one for each of the apostles minus Judas who betrayed Jesus).

Traditionally we celebrate Easter with chocolate eggs, although confectionery companies are coming up with a

range of alternative ideas. This formed the basis of one of the challenges for the contestants on Lord Sugar and the BBC's Apprentice programme this year. The eggs are a reminder of new life that we see all around us in Spring. Equally the empty shell of the egg is a reminder of the empty tomb that first Easter morning, and the gift of chocolate a reminder of the gift of Christ and the new life we are promised through his resurrection.

As we move forward we carry with us the traditions of the past, blending and shaping them with today's world. However we celebrate Mothering Sunday and Easter this year, I pray that you will know God's love for you and those you love.


