North Aston Parish EGM

Tuesday 13th May at 7:00 pm in the Old Bakery

There has been a request from the organisers of this year's Village Fête to hold an Extraordinary General Meeting in order to debate, and potentially approve, the use of a large proportion of the existing village funds in order to purchase replacement marquees for use at the Fête and other future village events.

As covered by the Minutes from recent Village Meetings, the old canvas marguees now pose a challenge, since they require considerable manpower to erect, and are also now starting to show their age. The need to replace them has been growing for some years, and the time to act has now arrived.

Martin Lipson, Chair of the MCNP Forum, offers an update on the recently published MCNP Review:


We're pleased to inform you that the Review of the Mid-Cherwell Neighbourhood Plan has now been published, and we would welcome your comments and feedback on it. The Consultation remains open until Friday, 23rd May 2025.

The updated Plan includes several important new planning policies, including the allocation of housing sites in some of the villages, aimed at meeting the needs of local people. There are also policies protecting the Mid-Cherwell environment, its landscape and biodiversity, and we've added more Local Green Spaces and more Local Gaps for protection from possible future development.

We want to know what you think about the new Plan: we have tried to make it as easy as possible for you to respond with our online questionnaire. If you prefer to use email or post to respond, a downloadable form is available on the website.

We have also printed a limited number of copies of the Plan document* and copies will also be available to examine at Deddington, Bicester and Banbury Libraries.

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North Aston Nature Notes With Stephen Rees

April saw spring arrive, and the countryside do its change once again. The weather has been changeable too, with lots of wind, rain, hot days and really cold days, but now it seems to have settled down a bit, thank goodness.

I have my first cup of tea in the morning sat outside in the garden, and it's been lovely to see the beech hedges change from brown to green over the days. It is always the same bit that changes first, and it's the section that gets the sun first and has it the longest through the day.

For my money, Wendy's garden is looking a real treat, with her Acer draping yellow-green over the grass and her apple in blossom. There are a few wild corners, full of nettles and dandelions, and I've never seen as many as there are this year. I think they look nice, but everyone I speak to hates them as a weed, but the bees love them, and that's good enough for me.

When we get our firewood for the year, all the snarly knotty bits that I can't be bothered to try to split are left in a pile down the bottom of the garden. As they slowly start to rot down, they attract the little birds that come to feed on all the insects and grubs. They're such fun to watch.

The Blackthorn blossom came big-time this year. Our hedge out the back (well, James and Vicky's hedge really, I suppose) looked like it was covered in snow. Most of the trees in and around our village are now heavy with leaf, and of so many different shades of green. Sometimes it just makes you want to stand and stare — back to my favourite poem again! What is this life if, full of care, We have no time to stand and stare. So true! I try to stand and stare as much as I can, and it's a good excuse to rest my knees a bit on a walk.

I think the best tree in our village this spring, that we have personally seen anyway, was Tony and Bev's cherry tree (below). It must have been the most beautiful display of the brightest pink blossom outside of Japan! It really was lovely for at least a week, and a credit to them both.



Down our track, and through the gate at the bottom, all the dog walkers will know there's a handsome apple tree that again is in full blossom. Touch wood, it hasn't all been blown off, and hopefully won't be before the fruit sets. It's a cooker and normally has a whopping harvest. Wendy and Trudy make the best apple pies from this tree. It was planted by David and Chris I think, goodness knows how many years ago, and Chris looked after it and bought it on.

For some reason we have been having geese and ducks fly over us in the mornings, calling to one-another and sounding beautiful. They make a good sight, and remind me of my favourite book, *The Snow Goose* by Paul Gallico, about a white goose in wartime, when the little boats went to evacuate the B.E.F.

I also haven't heard a Cuckoo either, despite reports from everyone else and their dog last month! By way of compensation, we have seen our beloved Curlew, which has returned to our *special secret place*. There are two of them and, I have to admit, it was Wendy who spotted them first, on the meadow, but only by a second or so. You should have seen the look on her face! Living with my wife, everything turns into a competition sometimes ...



Chris has lambs galore around the farm. They're looking so sweet, but will grow fast on the rich organic North Aston grass. While they're still small, do go and see them. Chris and his son Ben are very obliging people.

Even smaller, we've seen a few Brimstone butterflies flitting around the hedgerows, and our bee hotels are just starting to hatch out. They'll be busy soon, being filled again in the coming month. Enjoy spring!

North Aston Village Meeting

Monday 14th April 2025 ~ The Minutes

Officers present: Christopher Woodhead (CW, Chair), Stephen Walters (SW, Treasurer), Richard Hinzel (RH, Secretary).

Those present: Joanna Pochron (JP), Trudy Busby (TB), Clive Busby (CB), Mark Stay (MS), Jane Durnin (JD), Kildare Bourke-Borrowes (KBB), Bev Rees (BR), Tony Rees (TR), Sue Hatzigeorgiou (SH) and David Rogers (DR, CDC).

The Chair welcomed everyone, including David Rogers, CDC Local Councillor for Deddington.

Formal Business

1. Minutes of Meeting dated 9th January 2025

The Minutes of the previous Meeting and AGM, as published in the *North Aston News* were approved (CW proposed, RH seconded).

2. Treasurer's Report

Th Treasurer reported that the NA Parish Account has funds – in round figures - of £6500 and the NA Village Fund has funds of £4500.

Bank Accounts: As reported previously, the new NatWest account is up and running and all funds have now been transferred from the Santander account. However the Santander account has not yet been closed. Santander has been instructed to do so. To bring the true balances up to date, the Treasurer has noted that settlement of three small petty cash receipts are outstanding and that they will be included in the 2025/6 year accounts whilst settlement has been made from a small Petty Cash balance.

3. North Aston Website Domain

In his absence, Marcus Potts provided an email detailing that for the last 20 years, he has been paying for the village website domain and email addresses. The cost for all now runs at approximately £60 per year. Attendees agreed that Marcus should be reimbursed and that going forward payments should be made through the village account for those services deemed relevant to the village's needs. SW will liaise directly with MP on reimbursement of any prior payments he has made as well as on all ongoing account payments.

4. FTTP Broadband

MP has been liaising with Gigaclear and reports that Michelle Tanfield from the company will be contacting all households in the village directly by post soon to advise on a community meeting planned for the end of April or early May most likely to take place in the Duns Tew village hall.

5. Mid-Cherwell Neighbourhood Plan Review

James reported no further updates but encourages everyone to go to the website to review in more detail. Anyone can leave comments via the website.

6. Traffic Calming

Howard Ionascu (HI) has been liaising with councillor David McHugh as well as representatives from Somerton and Ardley who also have traffic concerns and propose the three village jointly discuss with Oxford County Council the public consultation, as the cost of £3500 can be spread across all three villages.

NA also has £14,500 available to it through Section 106 from Heyford Park in consideration for the housing development so far completed. These funds are only accessible for payment of or towards the actual creation of any physical changes needed after due consultation and not towards advisory fees.

Councillor McHugh submitted a proposal involving chicanes which was included in the April issue of NA News. Much debate as to chicanes vs speed bumps vs speed platforms followed, with many differing opinions. There was something resembling consensus on the use of speed platforms, possibly with a chicane at each end of the village.

Speed outside of the villages, between the Oxford Road, on Somerton Road, and all the way through Ardley is currently proposed to be reduced to 40mph. There was suggestion that this should be reduced to 30mph. Likewise it was stated that similar consideration should be given that the NA to Middle Aston / Steeple Aston road be similarly treated.

HI will attend a meeting with OCC Highways on a date TBC where he will share this feedback and ask what is possible, what OCC recommends, what regulations require, whether there is further funding from the Council and exactly what/who carries out the work. More information and undoubtedly more debate to follow.

7. Mikron Theatre Company

Mikron has been booked to perform on The Green for Friday 20th June. "Hush Hush", a comedic play about Bletchley Park, will be performed. Details can be found on the Mikron Theatre website.

8. Village Fête

The Fête will happen on 5th July. Nick will again upload the list of roles requiring volunteers on the village WhatsApp and the next planning meeting will take place on April 29 at 7pm in the Old Bakery.

9. Marquees

Nicholsons confirm that they are happy for marquees and equipment to continue to be stored at their location. Discussion regarding the purchase of new marquees to replace the old occurred, and whether it would be viable to share marquees with Duns Tew (who currently don't use marquees) or any other local village that might, such as Somerton.

It was agreed that the village would look at possibly sourcing between three and five large pop-up gazebos as a more cost-effective solution, rather than replacing with more expensive larger marquees. TR would research this more.

10. Defibrillator

A lead for training had been discussed at the last meeting. SH will follow up with TH.

11. Any Other Business

Easter Egg Hunt – CW volunteered to organise this year's hunt. **VE day – May 8** – There will be bell ringing at church and agreement for a gathering on The Green, with drinks, a minute of remembrance and attendees will be encouraged to share family stories. Bonfire on the green TBC.

Village Clean up – Rather than have one official day for this, villagers are encouraged to be vigilant and pick up rubbish whenever they see it.

Millennium Book – It was discussed that after 25 years perhaps an update would be welcomed. Discussion as to who would do this, publish the book, pay, etc lead to the realisation that it would become onerous, so no update is planned.

12. Date of Next Meeting

Confirmation of the date for the next Meeting will follow.

However, there will be an Extraordinary General Meeting on Tuesday 13th May to discuss, and vote upon, the possible replacement of the ageing canvas marquees. It is hoped that this will take place in the Old Bakery at 7:00 pm, but details will be confirmed nearer the time.

Email Scams

Hopefully residents are wary of these scams now — emails that purport to come from reputable agencies, 'reminding' you that your payment details need updating. TVP has issued warnings recently about a new spate, some involving TV licencing, others claiming to be from the DVLA regarding car tax payments. All will ask you to log-in to a website where you can "update your details". 99% will be fake; the sites intended solely to harvest your personal and banking details. It's usually easy to check the true source. One supposedly from the DVLA was actually sent from www.yum-o-licious.com, which was an instant red-flag, but if in any doubt, simply delete the message, and do not click any of the links.





A Thankyou from Josh ...

On the 27th April Josh Potts ran his first London Marathon, crossing the line in a little over four hours at the end of what everyone agreed was one of the most gruelling LMs in many years. The combination of unexpected heat, very still air, and over 56,000 runners made it even more challenging than usual.

When he signed up, Josh was not a runner. He rarely even jogged. However, once he'd overcome the surprise of gaining an entry, he was determined to tackle the event properly. "A year ago I couldn't have imagined doing this," he admitted. "I signed up as a bit of a joke. I had no running experience, but I really wanted to do this. I've trained so hard over the past year, running 4-5 times a week, doing multiple 10k and half marathon races, and then cracking down with a 16-week plan. I've been doing intensive strength training and completed multiple different types of runs every week. I also joined the most incredible and supportive running club, and even started going to the gym ... for the first time in my life."

He finished strongly, but not as quickly as he'd hoped. "I didn't achieve the time I trained for, but I've achieved so much else. I've raised over £1200 for BipolarUK, I've completed a marathon, and I've made some truly incredible life-long friends on this journey. The amount of support in the run-up, and during the race, has been absolutely incredible. I want to thank everyone who's supported me, including the people of

North Aston, several of whom sponsored me through my JustGiving page. I was also delighted to get some notes in envelopes!"

Josh is determined that this is just the beginning. "I'm going to be training hard now for my next marathon. I've proved to myself that I can run the distance, and now I need to work on improving my time." He will be running the Bristol Half-Marathon later this month.

Recent months have been fairly quiet, with calls ranging from fires at a waste recycling plant to a clothes bin.

One of the more challenging shouts came when we were asked to relieve appliances from Bicester and Oxford attending a fire at an industrial unit. This involved several electric forklifts that had caught fire while being recharged. When we arrived the fire had already been extinguished, but a lot of smoke was still inside. We were tasked with using our PPV (Positive Pressure Ventilation) fan to blow the smoke out of the building.

Ventilation is a critical part of firefighting, not only once the fire has been extinguished but also while there is still a fire inside the building. This may seem counter-intuitive, adding air to a fire, but 'smoke', the product of combustion, can include highly flammable gasses, and these can combust if they get hot enough. Called a *flashover*, this can cause the fire to spread rapidly, making the fire worse and also increasing the danger for the fire crews inside. Thick smoke also makes it very hard for firefighters to see where anything is. In the thickest smoke you can't even see your hand in front of your face.

Smoke can also be incredibly toxic and can quickly kill anyone trapped inside. That's why we wear breathing apparatus. If we can remove the smoke using the PPV, we can reduce the chance of the fire spreading, lower temperatures, allow crews to move more quickly and safely through the building, and


increase the chances of survival for anyone trapped inside. However, this can only be done once the fire itself is under control and the correct safety procedures are in place. Our PPV works by creating a seal of air around the entrance to a building and then pressuring the whole compartment to force the smoke and other hot fire gasses out of an exhaust port, usually a window or door. In the case of this incident, we only had to remove the smoke to make it safe for people to enter not wearing BA, since the fire itself was already extinguished.

This incident occurred because Lithium-ion batteries were left on charge, unattended. Please, don't make the same mistake! Never leave anything charging unattended. Be sure to place it on a non-flammable surface and always use a genuine charger for the device.

Related to this, our crews were involved in a trip to Banbury fire station where we could use their smokehouse to practise BA wearing. We have also been doing some pumps and ladder drills. These involve practising pitching our big 13.5 m ladder (which weighs over 100kg) and operating our pump on the fire engine to supply water. We have also been doing some IEC (Immediate Emergency Care) training. We have all received a level of medical training that allows us to deal with casualties under basic medical and trauma conditions, and we practise this regularly to keep our skills sharp, as we don't always get that much experience of this in the 'Real World'.

Deddington FS is keen to recruit new firefighters. If you live or work within five minutes of the station, and are interested in joining the team, then email me, or call in for a chat on a Tuesday between 1900 and 2100 when we will be training!

Let the Bells Ring Out ...

On the 8th May we will be celebrating the 80th anniversary of Victory in Europe Day (VE Day). The church bells at Steeple Aston will be rung at 6:30pm (and at North Aston from 7:00 pm) in celebration.

We are extremely fortune within the benefice to have two wonderful teams of bell ringers and I love hearing the bells ring out whether it's on a Sunday, just before a service (at Steeple Aston and Tackley), or on a Tuesday evening as the ringers practice or other occasions including when we host visiting ringers.

The ringing of church bells has been used for centuries as a way of proclaiming news,



both that a church service was about to start, and calling people to worship at a time when clocks were not common. They are also used to announce big news, such as the coronation of a new monarch, as local ringers did for King Charles' Coronation and more local news such as funerals and weddings.

As well as proclaiming cheerful news, church bells have been used to warn people of imminent danger. During the World Wars the ringing of the church bells was severely restricted, by the Defence of the Realm act. The ringing of the bells, especially in WW1, was reserved as a means of communication, their tolling would warn people that our shores had been invaded. At the end of both wars the church bells were rung in celebration.

With all our modern technology and news alerts, Church bells are no longer used to spread news. And yet, their ringing is still woven into our society, and I cannot imagine life without them. As they ring and we pause to listen I enjoy a beautiful moment of stillness, peace. As you listen to the church bells this summer, take a moment to enjoy them and think about what news you have to share be it happy or sad, and what you are thankful for, big or small.

If you would like to learn to ring, please contact our local Tower captains, or come along one Tuesday evening.

Please join us in SS Peter and Paul Church in Steeple Aston, following the ringing of the church bells on the 8th May, for a special VE-Day celebration service. When we will give thanks for 80 years of peace and pray for peace in the future.
